WHO WE ARE

THE GRAND APPEAL: WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH BRISTOL CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL SINCE 1995

As the Bristol Children's Hospital Charity, we're there every step of the way for sick children and their families. From the moment a child arrives at the hospital, our support workers offer comfort and advice; we give parents and siblings a free, comforting place to stay; provide daily music therapy sessions and arts and play activities; and fund the pioneering equipment and research that save lives. Whether we are running fundraising campaigns, funding the latest medical equipment, or working in partnership with the hospital to care for the patients, their families and the staff, we aim to ensure that Bristol Children's Hospital is the best it can possibly be.



The work we do really makes a difference and together, we have the power to change lives.



COTS FOR TOTS

Launched in 2010 to raise vital funds for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at St Michael's Hospital in Bristol. Cots for Tots provides lifesaving equipment, pioneering research and technology, family support and additional facilities to help save tiny lives. Cots for Tots also funds, manages and runs Cots for Tots House, a 12-bed family accommodation facility for the parents and siblings of babies in the unit.



GROMIT UNLEASHED

In 2013, 80 giant sculptures of Nick Park's internationally recognised Gromit character were designed by world-famous artists, celebrities and local talent. The campaign raised over £5 million for Bristol Children's Hospital and led to the creation of the award-winning Gromit Unleashed shop.



GROMIT UNLEASHED 2

In 2018, Gromit will return to the streets of Bristol for his second starring role in The Grand Appeal's popular sculpture trails. However, this time he'll be joined by best pal Wallace and arch-nemesis Feathers McGraw! Gromit Unleashed 2 will be the first arts trail in the world to use contactless donation technology, augmented and virtual reality, and interactive sculptures.



WALLACE & GROMIT'S CHILDREN'S CHARITY

Founded in 2003, Wallace & Gromit's Children's Charity supports children's hospitals and hospices throughout the UK. The charity has donated over £2 million to many different causes since 2003.



SHAUN IN THE CITY

In 2015, 120 giant sculptures of Aardman's Shaun the Sheep character formed two arts trails in Bristol and London. Over 1.2 million visitors viewed the 70 sculptures in Bristol, followed by an exhibition of all 120 sculptures in Covent Garden, which drew international attention.

WHERE WE'VE MADE A DIFFERENCE...

ALL THANKS TO YOU

In 1995, when we launched our first fundraising appeal, our mission was to make Bristol Children's Hospital the leading centre of paediatric care that it is today. Thanks to our wonderful army of fundraisers, our commitment to sick children and their families continues over 20 years later, and we're funding more than ever before.

OPERATIONAL FACILITIES

With an ever-expanding young population in the South West, we work with the teams at the hospital to ensure its facilities are the best they can be.

- We supported the reconfiguration and renovation of a new **Resuscitation Area for the Children's Emergency Department**, vitally increasing its capacity as a Major Trauma Centre.



- We are working with families with experience of losing a child to redecorate **The Rainbow Room**, which will offer families a safe, neutral space to say goodbye to their children and make precious, lasting memories.

When a child dies, our team is here to support those families. The Rainbow Room is a really important step in this heart-breaking journey these families are embarking upon. The aftercare of their child and the family are just as important as the care they receive in life, and we know that the memories that families are left with will be greatly improved by the renovation.

- This year we also began a complete refurbishment of the **Children's Oncology Ward** which will join the new playroom, conservatory, parent kitchen and play equipment in supporting these brave children.

PATIENT & FAMILY-FOCUSED EVENTS

The hospital cares for over 100,000 children and their families each year and covers one of the largest geographical areas of any children's hospital in the country. We support past, present and future patients from far-and-wide through a whole range of events and support groups, both in the hospital and the community.

- The annual **Disability Fun Day** at Bristol Zoo is for patients with additional needs, their siblings and families to meet each other, learn more about the hospital staff and support available and of course... have a blast!



- Growing up is never easy but imagine how difficult it can be with a life-long illness. Through our **Cardiac Christmas Parties and Brittle Bone Day**, we help children meet like-minded people who truly understand what it's like.
- When you're born with Congenital Heart Disease, you'll likely to need treatment well into your adult life. We help young adults with their transition to adult cardiac services in a special **Cardiac Transition Evening**.
- It is incredibly tough when your child is in the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU). Run by the psychology team, our **Monthly PICU Tea Parties** are a chance for families to lessen any feelings of isolation by encouraging them to meet others with critically ill children in the unit.
- Each year, we're able to send a team of incredible young people —all of whom have had major transplant surgery—to the **National Transplant Games**.

EQUIPMENT

We strive to ensure the hospital has the latest in advanced medical equipment so that every child treated there has the very best chance.

- A pioneering Babypod trolley has enabled the **Neonatal Emergency Stabilisation Team** to move twins together, safely and securely. With a huge reduction in transfer times and journeys, it is one less burden for parents of premature or poorly twins or triplets to think about.

The new Babypod took so much stress away from us, knowing that only one more trip was required. Seeing them all back together again was indescribable! We will always be grateful to the amazing NEST team for getting our girls safely back to our local hospital in as few trips as possible. Thank you so much.

- To minimise the separation anxiety and stress when NICU parents need to go home, we're able to provide **vCreate**, a secure video messaging technology which allows nurses to record and send video updates of special care babies to their parents and families.



Cots for Tots managed to get the devices and funding in just before Christmas, which was just the biggest helping hand. With Saul's older sister and brother at home in Swindon, we knew we needed to be there to try and give them the best Christmas we could. We were able to see these wonderful videos of Saul recorded by the nurses, and it helped us try to enjoy the day as best as we could.

- Our commitment to ensuring each critically ill baby has the very best chance at life saw us buy two **state-of-the-art ventilators** and two additional Jaundice Meters for NICU.

- A new **Portable Echo Machine** means specialists can now perform ultrasound examination of a patient's heart in outreach clinics across the entire South West.
- We've funded two of the latest **Haemodialysis Machines** for the hospital's specialist Renal Ward, which is a second home for many of its young patients.
- An additional, pioneering **Resuscitaire for the Emergency Department**—a specialist station which keeps critically ill babies warm during emergency treatment—has increased the department's capacity as a leading Major Trauma Centre in the UK.

In the last year alone The Grand Appeal has funded life-saving emergency equipment, better facilities for parents and families and support for our staff. Our partnership means we can improve the overall experience for our patients from the moment they enter our doors to the point that they leave.

- The new **NICU scanner** we've funded will play a crucial role in clinical decision making and will reduce the number of transfers of babies between NICU and the radiology department.

ARTS/EDUCATION AND ENVIRONMENT

Step into Bristol Children's Hospital and you'll instantly know it was designed with children in mind: bright and welcoming artwork adorns the walls, the nurses' stations look like trains, planes and automobiles, while

outside the iconic 'Lollipop' sculpture sits as a landmark for the hospital. We're proud to fund a diverse range of arts, education and environmental enhancements that help children and young people feel more at ease with their clinical surroundings.

- **Creating new identities** for wards and departments and new wayfinding throughout the hospital, helping patients and their families navigate its corridors with ease.
- Together with Bristol Heart Families, we've created a **Cardiac Teddy Programme** for patients with complex cardiac conditions. As these incredible children grow up and continue to battle CHD, the special certificate and teddy they receive will be a reminder of everything they've already overcome in their young lives.



- Coming to hospital for the first time can be a scary experience for a child. That's why we're funding a range of **Orientation Films**, starring patients both past and present, to help children understand how the unit works, from another young person's perspective.

RESEARCH

Our shared passion to help sick children now enters a new phase as we harness pioneering technology and the incredible expertise of the hospital teams to improve childhood health for generations to come.

- PICU is the beating heart of the children's hospital. It's where the region's most critically ill children are treated, and it's also where some of the country's most exciting discoveries and developments in children's healthcare are taking place. We're funding **two research posts**, beginning next year, which will expand the vital research capacity.



OUR SERVICES & OPERATIONS

We don't just fund services, we run them. Our Grand Appeal-operated programmes and services provide essential support to the hospital, its teams and its patients.

- Whether they're banging a drum, strumming the guitar or playing the flute, our fantastic **Grand Appeal Music Therapists** Karen and Claire bring smiles to over 30 children each week with their group and solo sessions across the wards.



- The activities centre is the hub of a diverse and creative **Arts Programme** at the hospital. Open five days a week for both patients and their siblings, we fund a whole host of arts activities and workshops with musicians and artists all year round.
- At the end of March this year, we were delighted to open **Paul's House**, the latest in our growing family accommodation provision. Based just across from the hospital, this eight-bedroom house offers a free, private and safe home-away-from-home for parents of critically ill children.

- As a tertiary NICU for the entire South West, St Michael's often looks after premature babies born at 23 weeks' gestation from across the South West and beyond. Our **Cots for Tots House** has helped 1350 families since it opened its doors in 2012.

Cots for Tots House is absolutely wonderful. Because it was only across the road it meant I could just pop in, which made it easier when I was feeding Archie before he could come home.

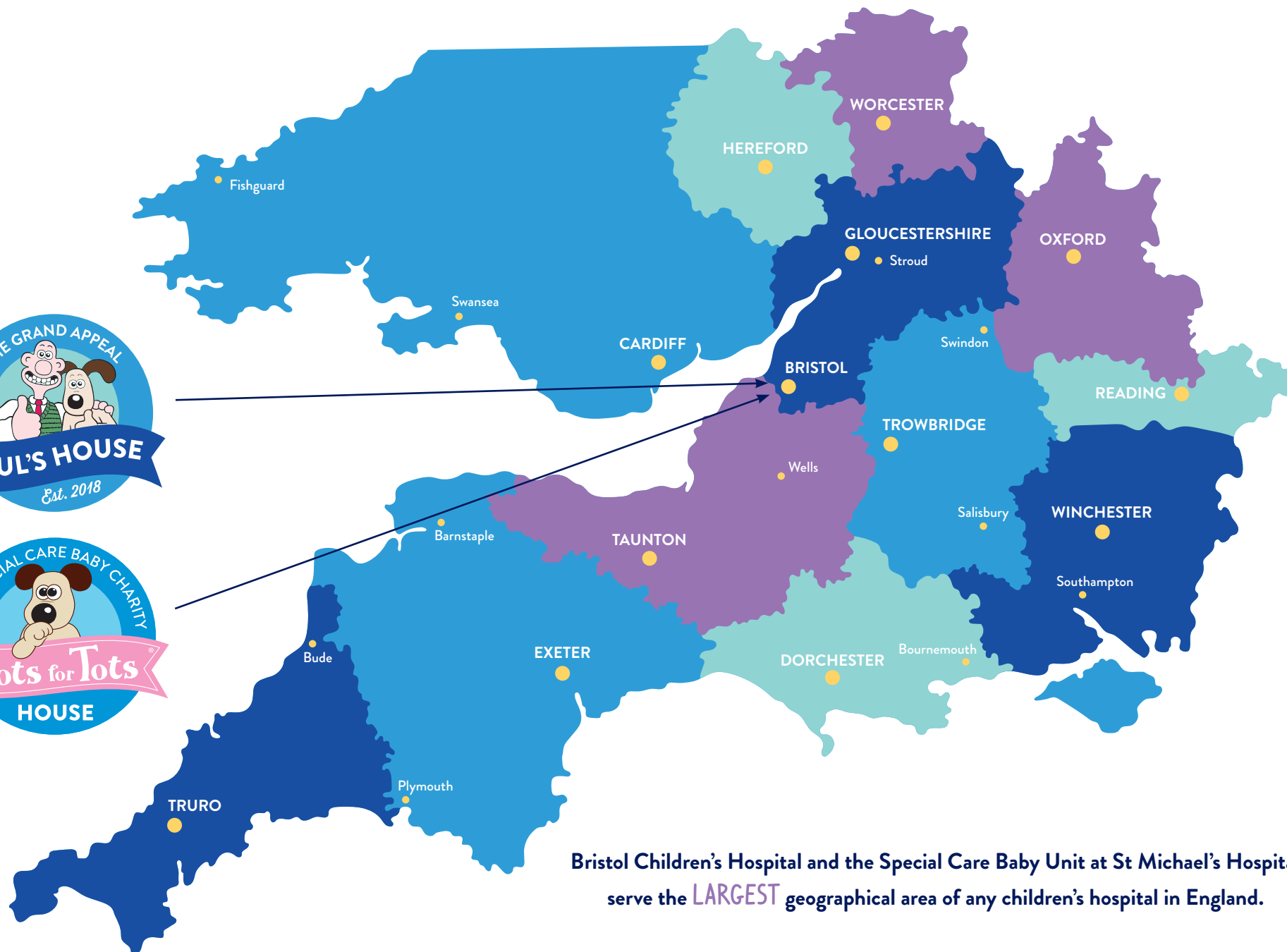

Bristol Children's Hospital and the Special Care Baby Unit at St Michael's Hospital serve the **LARGEST** geographical area of any children's hospital in England.

- Navigating the journey to adulthood can be a daunting time for teenagers, especially for those with cancer. In the dedicated Teenage and Young Adult Unit, our Music Therapy and part-funded **Reflexology sessions** promote relaxation, reduce anxiety and improve their quality of life.

PEOPLE

At the heart of the hospital are the hundreds of dedicated healthcare professionals who work day and night to provide support—both medical and emotional/psychological—to those in need. As the hospital's dedicated charity, we support this vital resource to make sure it's the best it can be. As well as our two Music Therapists, we have three specialist teams who play vital roles in supporting the patients and families cared for at Bristol Children's Hospital.

- Sensory play is an essential part of child development and is particularly effective as an essential outlet for children who are in pain, distressed or anxious about their stay in hospital. **The Grand Appeal Sensory Play Practitioner**, Marius, works with a range of children aged 0-17 years with special and additional needs across all specialties.

The physio, arts, play and neurorehabilitation teams have all been absolutely incredible and feel like our family here. Seb has made massive progress, and Marius has played a huge role in that.

- When you have a child in hospital, you may need extra support—whether that's psychological, financial or simply a shoulder to cry on. **The Grand Appeal Family Support Workers** help families cope with the pressures and complexities that come with having a child in hospital.



- Whenever we begin a new project at the hospital, we ask the people who know it best: the patients. The Youth Involvement Group, supported by the **Young Persons Involvement Worker** role that we part-fund, is made up of young patients who are passionate about the NHS.

The Youth Involvement Group is so important, not only in making a young person's stay in hospital easier, but young people engaged with their health have better outcomes, so there are long-term positive implications, too!

Some serious peddle power came from an intrepid team of 71 fundraisers who, in June, set off in darkness to take on the **Bristol Nightrider**. Team Grand Appeal truly came out in force that evening, with the largest charity representation for the hugely popular cycling challenge. They were followed by our inaugural **Land's End to Bristol challenge** in September, which saw 18 ambitious fundraisers cycle an incredible 240 miles in just four days! This team of cycling superstars included long-standing patron David Sproxton, Trustee Simon Cooper and a team from our friends at Aardman, rightly called 'Aardriders.'

Together, our two wheeled friends raised an impressive **£60,000.**



Conquering the outdoors has always been popular in the South West, with many fundraisers choosing to run, ride and stride their way to victory. But this year, staff from across the hospital went to extraordinary lengths for their patients. Led by consultant (and resident superhero) Sian Thomas, the team pulled together in a 24-hour, **365-mile 'rowathon'** to raise £3,200 for the Emergency Department. And just a few months later, a team of six doctors and surgeons braved tidal waters, waves and jellyfish to swim the English Channel and raise £16,000 for a specialist **bereavement space** in the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit.

It is some of those bereaved families and the community that surrounds them that become the hospital's most loyal supporters. This year, the Bignell and Tucker families have raised £25,000 each, in memory of their beloved boys. 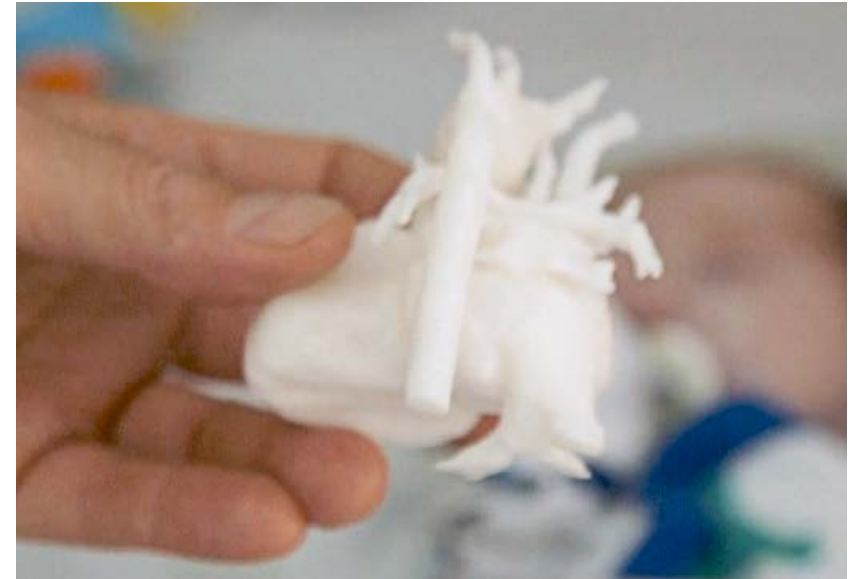

WHERE NEXT?

TWENTY-THREE YEARS AND OVER £50 MILLION LATER...

Our vision to transform the lives of sick children and their families has never changed. With more fundraisers, ideas and technology at our disposal than ever before, the next 12 months will have a huge impact; and we are committed to helping more children, young people and their families than ever before. As well as continuing our support of our ongoing commitments across many wards, teams and departments, our focus will include:



3D BIO- PRINTING UNIT

The Grand Appeal's 3D Bio-Printing Unit will revolutionise the future of cardiac care. This service will enable exact replicas of an individual's heart to be made and allow the team to plan and even practice complex operations before surgery. It also can crucially help young patients and their families to understand even the most complex cardiac conditions and operations. In the future, bio-printing will be expanded to other services within the hospital. Thanks to current ground-breaking research by the hospital's experts, one day we'll be able to use the 3D printer with stem cells, drastically reducing the amount of operations some patients will need as they grow up.

FAMILY ACCOMMODATION

The need for family accommodation has never been greater. That's why next year we'll continue to expand our vital family accommodation for both St Michael's NICU and Bristol Children's Hospital, as well as numerous parent beds in the hospital so parents can remain at their child's bedside when they need them most.



CHILDREN'S EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

The Children's Emergency Department continues to break records with its ever-increasing number of patients. Our innovative and long-standing partnership with the department will revolutionise the current waiting room and fund another pioneering Resuscitaire.

BEREAVEMENT HUB

As part of our commitment to supporting families through the heart-breaking loss of a child, we will create a specialist Bereavement Hub at the hospital. Together with The Rainbow Room, this will make a crucial and much needed change to the experience bereaved families at the hospital.

The Charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

1. Charity Commission

The Grand Appeal received an excellent report from the Charity Commission as part of a routine review of charities in the past 10 years.

2. Trustees

The Charity has a board of four Trustees, all of whom are independent of the NHS and are appointed for their competence, profile and specialist skills. The Trustees are volunteers and are not paid for their involvement in The Grand Appeal. Trustees have no personal or beneficial interest in Bristol Children's Hospital, the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, University Hospitals Bristol NHS Foundation Trust or any other NHS body. Trustees are responsible for delivering sound governance, protecting the charity's assets and safeguarding risks to the charity.

3. Operational Management

The Trustees delegate operational management to the Director, Nicola Masters.

4. Related Parties

Simon Cooper, Jos Moule and Nicola Masters are Directors of the wholly owned subsidiary, Cracking Enterprises Ltd. David Sproxton, Peter Lord and Nick Park are Directors of Wallace & Gromit Ltd and Aardman Animations Ltd. Angie Last is an employee of Aardman Animations Ltd. Jos Moule is a partner with Veale Wasbrough Vizards LLP.

5. Reserves

The Appeal is committed to providing a continuing programme of funding for Bristol Children's Hospital, the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Paul's House and Cots for Tots House. The Grand Appeal also

has significant plans to invest in services, operations and developments in Bristol Children's Hospital and NICU in the coming year.

- **£862,618** is restricted as per donor wishes
- **£1,832,362** is held in property assets and is not readily transferrable to cash
- **£915,000** is held in furtherance of the charity's purpose to develop new family accommodation
- **£352,000** is held to continue operations and services
- **£1,571,330** is held in reserve to complete projects in the next financial year

6. Risk Management

The Trustees examine the principal areas of the charity's operation and receive reports on operations, reputational and financial risk. Trustees are satisfied that the major risks are identified with processes in place for management. Trustees recognize that no absolute assurances can be given and the management provide reasonable confidence that the risks are identified and controlled.

7. Investment Policy

Fund investment is controlled by the Executive within the policy set by the Trustees, which is to exercise prudence in the practice of Fund Management. Assets are held in property and cash (on the London money markets) to project and maximise the return on investment and to minimise risk.

8. Advisory Committee

During 2018, an Honorary Medical Advisory Committee was established to inform the Board. The HMAc acts in an advisory capacity only and is not part of the formal accountability structure of the Appeal. The Medical Advisory Committee is not remunerated in any way for their advice, which is provided on a purely voluntary basis. The membership consists of:

Opinion

STATUTORY INFORMATION

Wallace & Gromit's Children's Foundation is a private company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information page.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they

have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Staff costs are apportioned based on the proportion of time spent on the relevant activities. Other costs are directly allocated to the activities that they relate to.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

- Freehold property - Straight line over 50 years
- Office equipment - Straight line over 4 years
- Fixture & Fittings - Straight line over 5 years

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the trustees' report.

22. PURPOSE OF RESTRICTED FUNDS

The Grand Appeal receives many donations from supporters, donors, patients, friends, families and the general public with a specific designation. The Appeal acknowledges that all donations received for a specific ward or department should be spent according to the needs of the donor and therefore retains the above funds to ensure full compliance with the individual donor's intentions. These funds are then used to provide additional 'added value' facilities and to comply with donor wishes.

23. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

In the Triennial Review 2017 the Financial Reporting Council clarified its guidance regarding the treatment of gift aid payments from a trading subsidiary to its charitable holding company. It stated that although such payments are donations for tax purposes, they are a distribution from the entity to its owners for company law purposes. As a result FRS 102 requires the gift aid payment to be accounted for as a distribution to owners. It states that an expected gift aid payment shall not be accrued unless a legal obligation to make the payment exists at the reporting date. A prior year adjustment has therefore been made to ensure that the 2017 figures complied with this guidance.
