Encourage participants to donate when they submit their entry – 20p, 50p or even £1!




Inspired by Aloha Gromit, hold a Hawaiian theme dress down day or choose another theme from one of the sculptures from the trail.

SCULPTURE DESIGN INSPIRATION WORKSHEET

Coming up with the perfect design for a Gromit may take a little time. Before your class or group launch into putting pen to paper, take some time to do the following exercises to get your imaginations brewing.

Art Evaluation

Check out some of our sculptures from this year's exhibition and ask your participants to evaluate each one. Ask them the following questions:

- What do you really like about the sculpture?
- What you think the artist did well?
- What could improve the artwork?

- What is your least favourite part of the design?
- Which is your favourite sculpture and why?
- Which Gromit inspired faraway destination would you like to visit and why?



Sculpture Name: RIO

What's the inspiration behind this design?

Down in the jungle where nobody goes, there's a leafy looking doggo with a colourful nose. Representing South America, Rio beautifully reflects the Amazon Rainforest with tropical leaves covering him head to toe and with a special three-toed sloth hanging from his side highlighting the extraordinary wildlife that exists within it.

Did you know?

Rio means 'River' in Portuguese!

Sculpture Name: YEAR ^{of} GROMIT

What's the inspiration behind this design?

Year of the Gromit is an elegant sculpture that captures the colours, drama, and ceremony of the Chinese lion dance, a form of traditional dance in Chinese culture. Gromit is dressed in traditional Chinese costume ready for Chinese New Year celebrations!

Did you know?

The date for Chinese New Year changes each year and is dictated by the Chinese lunar calendar.



Sculpture Name: ALOHA!

What's the inspiration behind this design?

Inspired by the hot tropical climate of Hawaii, say 'Aloha' to our tikitastic doggo decorated with a hula grass skirt, tribal markings and tropical hibiscus leaves and flowers. The lei around Gromit's neck is the name given to a wreath of flowers that is a symbol of affection, celebration and love in Hawaiian culture.

Did you know?

Aloha is used to say both hello and goodbye in Hawaii!



Sculpture Name: ICE ICE PUPPY

What's the inspiration behind this design?

Taking you on an adventure into the Arctic circle, this spectacular and sparkly design reflects the icy magical landscape of the north. Covered in a flurry of snow with the still Arctic Ocean at his feet and an impressive Northern Light's display on his back, this is certainly one enchanting Gromit.

Did you know?


The northern lights are also known as 'aurora borealis' and are a natural phenomenon found in the northern hemisphere.

Creative Writing

Ask your pupils or group members to write a short story based on a Grand Adventure.

They could use one of the Gromit's from the exhibition as the main character and one of the locations for the setting. Or make up their own! They could even base their story on an adventure they have been on or want to go on.
